Reminder* What is ASL?

“American Sign Language (ASL) is a visual language. With signing, the brain processes linguistic information through the eyes. The shape, placement, and movement of the hands, as well as facial expressions and body movements, all play important parts in conveying information.

ASL is a language with its own unique rules of grammar and syntax. Like all languages, ASL is a living language that grows and changes over time. ASL is used predominantly in the United States and in many parts of Canada..”

Reminder: Who knew?

" Most hearing people think that American Sign Language is English, in sign language. **It is not English.** It is actually classified as a foreign language and it has nothing to do with English, It is a visual language with no written form."

Reminder: Not all ASL users have a large vocabulary in ASL

- Meaning of English terms may need a pictograph to expand on the concept for better comprehension.

Reaching out to Deaf AA members

- ASL interpreters can help us communicate our legacy to Deaf members at meetings and events
- Video meetings create a bridge between Deaf AA's and prospective Deaf AA members who are scattered around the country.

Web Cam meetings are not social media and are needed by Deaf to reach the suffering alcoholic who is Deaf or H H



😊 **A Solution** 😊

Technology is one solution to a 6 decade long challenge of carrying the AA message to those who are Deaf/HH and use Sign Language.

1950's is the first article I could find on ASL users holding a meeting V.M.

ASL Interpreted Meetings

- Deaf members receive information at the meeting such as: How it Works, Steps, Traditions and sharing.
- Deaf members and hearing members can dialogue through a 3rd party.

Is something missing?

Outside of an interpreted AA meeting a Deaf newcomer may face significant barriers to:

- the fellowship
- sponsorship
- a sense of community.
- Understanding of the AA service structure

AA-ASL Web Cam Meetings

- Emerged from within Deaf Community for the Deaf Community
- Enables any AA person in the world, with a computer, to login and have a face to face AA meeting, where all the participants use sign Language (ASL or otherwise)
- This creates an AA community
- Text Chat video meeting help non ASL deaf members.
